Keep Being Surprised

What has surprised you recently?

Maybe you have been surprised by a gift, or a surprise party? Surprised by the weather? Surprised by someone's reaction to something you have said? Surprised by the rising cost of things?

We can be surprised by many thing; surprises can be good or they can be bad - but they always keep us learning and growing; discovering more about ourselves and the world around us.

Surprises can be big or they can be small. I have grown a pumpkin for the first time this year, and I have been surprised at just how large the plant has grown! I have also been surprised by how quickly brambles grow as well....

I have also been continually surprised by the variety, joys, and challenges of being a Priest in Charge of five churches; surprised by the hard work and dedication that is needed by many people working together to keep the church running, worshipping, and serving the local community; and by how wonderful it has been to get to know people, both inside and outside of the church.

C.S. Lewis, the author of "The Lion, The Witch, and The Wardrobe" wrote a book on his conversion to Christianity. He titled it: Surprised by Joy.

Faith in Jesus is a journey that is full of surprises. There are certainly challenges, as we seek to follow Jesus' call to love our neighbours (and that includes the ones we may not like very much, or even consider our enemies) and to love God with everything that we have; but it is also a journey of being surprised by the joy of knowing we are loved by God, no matter our past or our current situation, and that we are forgiven through Jesus.

Whatever your faith and beliefs: be open to surprises that enrich our lives. Sometimes we need help as we face some of the tougher surprises in life (and please let me know if I can help at all) - but there is often the surprise of grace within those tough times.

Be open to surprises, and be open to the possible surprises that God may have for you.

All Hallows Eve – or Holy Evening

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1 November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.

It has been customary for the three churches in the Downham Group to hold a service around All Hallows so we can remember those who have gone before us. This year the service takes place on Sunday 27 October at 3.00pm in St Margaret's Downham. During the service we will read a list of names of our loved ones who have gone before. There are lists in our three churches where you can add the name(s) of anyone you wish to be named.


On Sunday 1 September 48 members and friends enjoyed a wonderful day at Capel Manor Gardens, where we were blessed with glorious weather. Not

All in the month of October

lt was: -

250 years ago, on 26 October 1774 that the Colony of Massachusetts Bay began building up its militia of 'minute men', who could respond to the growing British threat at a moment's notice. The American Revolutionary War began a few months later.

200 years ago, on 21 October 1824 that British mason, bricklayer and cement manufacturer Joseph Aspdin was granted a British patent for Portland cement. His son William went on to develop a stronger version and is regarded as the inventor of modern Portland cement.

175 years ago, on 17 October 1849 that Frederic Chopin, Polish composer and piano virtuoso, died.

125 years ago, from 11 October 1899 to May 1902 that the Second Boer War in South Africa took place. 22,000 British forces were killed, and nearly 100,000 wounded. More than 6,000 Boers were killed, and more than 46,000 African civilians died in concentration camps.

100 years ago, on 15 October 1924 that the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbour was designated a US National Monument.

90 years ago, on 16 October 1934 that the Long March took place. Chinese communists led by Mao Zedong began a year-long 8,000-mile march from south-east China to north-west China to evade the armies of the Chinese National Party and establish a new base. It led to the founding of the People's Republic of China.

Also 90 years ago, on 24 October 1934 that the earliest known recording of the song Santa Claus is Comin' to Town was released. Performed by banjo player Harry Reser and his band and sung by Tom Stacks, it has since been recorded by more than 200 other artists.

80 years ago, on 2 October 1944 that the Warsaw Uprising in Poland was ended. The Germans destroyed the city, killing 200,000 civilians and expelling 700,000.

Also 80 years ago, on 9 October 1944 that British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Soviet leader Jospeh Stalin met to discuss the future of post-war Europe.

Also 80 years ago, from 23 to 26 October 1944 that the Battle of Leyte Gulf took place as part of the Pacific Campaign. Allied victory, considered to be the largest naval battle in history. The Japanese Navy was eliminated from the war.

75 years ago, on 1 October 1949 that the People's Republic of China was founded by Mao Zedong.

70 years ago, from 30 October to 13 November 1954 that the first Rugby World Cup was held in Paris. Great Britain beat France 16-12 in the final.

65 years ago, on 11 October 1959 that Britain began introducing postcodes. They began in Norwich, and by 1974 had been rolled out across the whole country.

60 years ago, on 14 October 1964 that the American civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for combating racial inequality in the USA without violence.

50 years ago, on 2 October 1974 that US researchers announced that smoking cannabis causes lasting brain damage. More than 50 medical schools and research centres took part in the year-long government-funded study.

Also 50 years ago, on 9 October 1974 that Oskar Schindler, Austria-Hungarian-born German businessman, died. He saved more than 1,100 Jews during the Holocaust by employing them in his factories. The story is told in the film Schindler's List.

40 years ago, on 12 October 1984 that an IRA bomb exploded during the Conservative Party Conference at the Grand Hotel in Brighton, killing five people. Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher was apparently the primary target, but she escaped injury.

Also 40 years ago, on 16 October 1984 that South African Anglican bishop Desmond Tutu won the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize for his role in the opposition to apartheid.

30 years ago, on 13 October 1994 that the three main loyalist paramilitary groups in Northern Ireland announced a ceasefire following the IRA's ceasefire announcement on 31 August.


Also 30 years ago, on 14 October 1994 that Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, and Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres jointly won the 1994 Nobel Peace Prize.

Also 25 years ago, on 27 October 1999 that the House of Lords voted to end the automatic right of hereditary peers to sit and vote in the upper chamber of Parliament. Of over 700 hereditary peers, only 92 would remain, chosen by election.

20 years ago, on 2 October 2004 that the first Parkrun was held in Bushy Park, London. Parkruns are now held every Saturday morning at more than 2,000 locations in 22 countries.


